

Woodson Terrace Police Department Mission Statement



We will continually examine community values, our beliefs, and re-evaluate priorities. We will inaugurate effective responses to promote and maintain services and protection for this community."






WOODSON TERRACE POLICE DEPARTMENT ORGANIZATIONAL CHART

The Officers of the Woodson Terrace Police Department handled 6,896 incidents throughout the year. These calls consisted of a wide range of incidents. They include traffic stops, burglaries, barking dogs, suspicious persons, and many more. They took 582 written reports for some of those calls for service and made 95 arrests. There were also 59 auto accident reports taken.

One incident that I would like to highlight was the one Homicide that we investigated on June 1st in the 9500 Block of Harold. Officers received a report of shots fired in that area and upon arrival located two victims of a shooting. Sadly one subject was deceased and the other was wounded. The responding officers secured the scene and it was decided to activate the Greater St. Louis Major Case Squad to assist us in the investigation. Once the Major Case Squad arrived, the incident was turned over to them. With the dedicated Major Case Squad investigators and Woodson Terrace Officers, the investigations led to an arrest with in about 17 hours. The case was presented to the St. Louis County Prosecuting Attorney's Office with charges issued.

Another investigation which came from a traffic stop resulted in the seizure of 11,509.8 grams of Marijuana. The subject who was on his way to Chicago was taken into custody and warrants were applied for. This drug seizure is one of the largest in the history of the department.





Woodson Terrace Police Department Personnel Roster and Years of Service

The Woodson Terrace Police Department for the year of 2022 was comprised of 17 officers. The ranks and organization consisted of one (1) Chief of Police, one (1) Captain, one (1) Lieutenant, three (3) Sergeants, one (1) Corporal, eight (8) Patrol Officers, and two (2) Detectives. We had hired several officers and lost several as they left for other departments or left law enforcement for private sector jobs. The following was the makeup of those officers:

These officers came to us with prior law enforcement experience from other departments.

The department provides police service to the residents on a twenty-four hour basis, seven days a week, all year long. The front lobby may close after normal business hours but we are always here to serve the city and its visitors.

Community Involvement



The Woodson Terrace Neighborhood Watch group came back and was started up by Det. Anton and Cpl. Brown. They worked in conjunction with Council Member Caroline Martin to bring the program back after it was stopped due to Covid-19. The group meets at multiple times of the year and discusses several different topics for safety and crime prevention.



The Business Outreach Program was started in 2022 and Officers had begun the process of contacting all of our local business and updating their emergency contact information. This program was developed to create a network of business leaders and owners to have better communication with each other and the department.

The Department also participated in a couple of city events. One of those events was for Halloween. Yesterday's Bar and Grill hosted a community Trunk-or-Treat and we were asked to participate. We were excited to be a part of it and got to see many great costumes and residents. It was a great time and we ran out of candy.







Another event was when Santa Claus came to pay a visit at the city's Christmas Party. The Christmas party was put on by the Woodson Terrace City Hall for the families of the city. The kids that came got a chance to see Santa and received some gifts. The also enjoyed a nice warm pancake breakfast.



Our department was also a part of the Muni-Central Patrol Citizens Police Academy. Lt. Orlando represented our department along with the cities of St. John, Overland, and Breckenridge Hills. The class was held on Wednesday nights and lasted for nine (9) weeks. Each student successfully graduated and received a certificate and t-shirt. They learned all about traffic enforcement, Community Policing, crime scenes and investigations, along with firearms and other aspects of Law Enforcement.

One event that we love to be a part of and hope that it continues is Christmas in the streets. We have partnered up twice now with St. Louis Youth Sports Outreach which provides sports equipment to area youth. The STLYSO partners up with other area cities and delivers donated toys, games, and bikes to kids all over. We were also joined by Santa Claus, the Grinch, and we even had some St. Louis Cardinals with us.





Police Accreditation

Even with all that we do we are also working on improving our department. We began a community survey asking our residents how well we are doing and what we can improve on. Our department is also working on becoming CALEA accreditated. The Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, CALEA, was formed in 1979 and is considered the gold standard for professional law enforcement agencies. CALEA standards are what holds police departments accountable by making sure they are following their policies and procedures.

We began our accreditation process on May of 2021 and are currently in the three year self-assessment phase. We have been going through all of our 95 Standard Operating Procedures (SOP's) and making sure we are up to date with case law and CALEA standards. Once we finalize our self-assessment phase, we will conduct a mock assessment which will allow us to see how well we are doing and correct any issues we may have. After the mock assessment, we move into a dual on-site/virtual assessment where a team of cetified assessors will verify that we are following our policies.

If we meet all the standards by CALEA, we will be awarded ourt first ever accreditation. We hope to receive the award by June of 2024. You can also visit and make comments on the CALEA Citizen's Portal and there is a link on our website.
