

City of Woodson Terrace Public Works Department

As the leaves begin to turn and the temperatures drop, the City of Woodson Terrace Public Works Department is hard at work making sure our streets, parks, and public spaces are ready for the season ahead. Fall is a busy time for our crews, with projects shifting from summer maintenance to preparing the city for winter weather.

Leaves & Yard Waste Falling leaves are beautiful, but they can also clog storm drains and create slippery conditions. Residents are encouraged to rake and bag leaves for scheduled yard waste pickups and to avoid blowing leaves into the street (this is against our Code: Chapter 215.090 and you will get a ticket for littering.) Our crews will be out regularly, ensuring that stormwater systems remain clear.

Street & Sidewalk Maintenance - Before freezing weather arrives, our team is inspecting and repairing roads and sidewalks. This helps prevent hazards during icy conditions and reduces costly repairs in the spring. If you notice potholes or uneven pavement, you can report them to Public Works so we can address them promptly.

Seasonal Chipping Program & Tree Trimming - Our seasonal chipping program begins October 1st and will run through the end of June 2026. The Public Works department will be out trimming trees and vegetation around the city's roadways this fall. Trimming back branches not only keeps our streets looking neat but also ensures that emergency vehicles, school buses, and snowplows have a safe and clear path in the months ahead.

Snow & Ice Preparedness - While we're still enjoying cool fall days, our crew is already preparing snow removal equipment and stocking road salt. When the first snow falls, we'll be ready to keep streets clear and safe for drivers and pedestrians.

How You Can Help This Fall

- · Keep leaves, branches, and debris out of the streets and away from storm drains.
- Trim back vegetation on your property that may obstruct sidewalks or roadways.
- · Park vehicles off the street during snow events to give plows more room to work.
- · Report any streetlights that are out—shorter daylight hours make lighting even more important.

The Public Works Department thanks our residents for their cooperation and community pride. Together, we can make sure Woodson Terrace stays safe, clean, and welcoming throughout the fall and winter seasons.

CITY CONSULTANT

City of Woodson Terrace included in expanded RECA coverage for cancer victims. Earlier this year, the federal RECA program was expanded by Congress to include certain North St. Louis County and City zip codes as eligible to receive compensation due to illness from certain cancers. The radioactive exposure is the result of uranium processing and disposal in St. Louis as part of the WW II Manhattan Project. You can find more information on this exposure, covered zip codes and cancers, as well as access an application at St. Louis County - RECA Missouri Resources (https://reca-missouri-resources.org/impacted-area/st-louis-county).

Individuals who have one of the listed cancers, and lived/ worked/attended school or other frequent activity in one of the zip codes, may receive a tax free payment of \$50,000. If a relative suffered one of the cancers their closest relative(s) may receive a payment of \$25,000. Documentation, ie, proof of residency, work or school, evidence of death and cancer diagnosis are required. The resources page will help work through those questions and requirements.

City Officials receive update on Lambert Airport and I-70 Improvements. On August 13, the City of Woodson Terrace hosted a meeting with Lambert Airport and Missouri Department of Transportation (MO-DOT) to provide a detailed update to the City, the Gateway Airport Communities Coalition, local business and government stakeholders on plans for improvements at the airport and on I-70. The briefing focused on the recent approval by the Federal Aviation Administration for the airport to proceed with plans to modify the airfield configuration, and connecting runways and roadways, from a two-terminal to a single combined terminal configuration.

At the same time, MO-DOT is finalizing a scope of work for Segment 2 of the I-70 STL Conceptual Study on improvements between Lindbergh Blvd and N. Hanley. Part of this will be consideration of airport connections and other modifications proposed by local municipalities and stakeholders, such as improved connections and wayfinding for Woodson Road and other key connecting corridors. SOME KEY MEETING TAKEAWAYS:

- Airport modifications will use the existing footprint and not require property acquisition or encroachment.
- They report "no significant impact" from noise under this new configuration. The City raised concerns that noise has increased and that past mediation may not be enough. If you are experiencing increased noise, we encourage you to contact the Noise Information Office at (314) 551-5070 or noiseinformation@flystl.com.
- Roadway plans include shifting the west airport entrance from Airflite Drive to Cypress Road. Public access at Airflite will close but access to I-70 will continue. Earlier input from city officials convinced the airport to include direct access for airport business shuttles and service providers at Airflite Drive rather than forcing them into the public queue. Most public access to the airport terminal will be directly from I-70 into a queue line to the combined terminal. It is unclear if Brown Road/Cargo Drive may provide local access.
- Terminal 2 metro will remain open. The City is talking with Bi-State Metro, MO-DOT and others about a Woodson Road connection by road or walkway. We were pleased to learn that MO-DOT plans to begin a Woodson Road Study that will consider ideas generated by the City of Woodson Terrace and local stakeholders.
- Future use of the Southwest terminal, which is directly adjacent to Woodson Road, is yet to be determined. It is of keen interest to the City to work with the airport, MO-DOT, citizens and stakeholders to improve connections to the airport, metro station and I-70 as part of this project, in ways that support plans to increase economic opportunity along the high priority Woodson Road Gateway Corridor. We always appreciate input from local residents and businesses on how these and other ideas could positively or negatively impact you. BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

It's hard to believe that school is already back in session and the summer has come and gone. If you have not done so already, now would be a great time to think about school safety for you and your children.

TEACH OR REPEAT STRANGER DANGER:

• If you have not already had cause to teach your children about strangers and the dangers that accompany them, now is the time. Children should not go off to school without understanding the need to stay away from strangers and not to be fooled. Discussing the types of things that are okay and the types of things that should be avoided is vital. Talk about the rules of who will pick them up from school. The list should be short and limited to only the people they know well.

HAVE AN EMERGENCY PLAN IN PLACE

• Children always feel safer when they know what to do in the event of different situations. For example, what would they do if the school had an emergency and they needed to get someplace safe outside the school? In a world where significant events are now more common it is imperative that parents and children have a plan. It is far better for them to know what to do and what not to do should an emergency happen. Have a primary place to meet and a backup in case of an emergency. Meeting locations could be a specific part of the school grounds or a trusted home close by.

MAKE A SAFETY CARD

 Your child should have a laminated card on them that gives their name, address, phone number, emergency contacts and medical conditions at a minimum. This information can be extremely important should they become lost or sick away from home or school.

DISCUSS BULLYING AND SOCIAL ISSUES

• Bullying has taken the forefront, but the other issues are out there as well (drugs, peer pressure, smoking, etc.). Discuss all these things with your children no matter how uncomfortable it might seem. Over time you will build a trustworthy line of communication that your kids will value as much as you. Bullying is not something you can ignore as a parent. Give your kids real solutions and the power to defend themselves.

DISCUSS CYBERBULLYING

Cyberbullying is similar to other types of bullying, except it takes place online and through text messages. Cyberbullies can be classmates, online acquaintances, and even anonymous users, but most often they know their victims.



- Talk to your child: Caution them about responding to the cyberbully. This is not a time for them to lash out or start a cyberwar themselves. This is not a time to "try to get even." See if they think they know the identity of the cyberbully or cyberbullies. See if this is related to an offline bullying situation, and deal with that quickly. And don't confuse the language most kids use online with cyberbullying. It may be shocking to us, but unless it is shocking to your child, it's not cyberbullying.
- Ignore it: A one time, seemingly unthreatening act, like a prank or mild teasing should probably be ignored. (If it's a threat, you must report it.) At the same time, you may want to consider using some preventive measures.
- Restrict the people who can send you communications:
 Consider restricting all incoming communications to preapproved senders, such as those on your child's friend list. (If the cyberbully is someone on his or her friend list, though, this method won't help. In that case the cyberbully will have to be removed from the friend list and/or blocked.)
- Google your child: Make sure that the cyberbully isn't posting attacks online. When you get an early warning of a cyberbullying campaign, it is essential that you keep an eye on your child's screen name, nick names, full name, address, telephone and cell numbers and websites. You can also set up an "alert" on Google to notify you whenever anything about your child is posted online.
- Block the sender: Someone who seems aggressive or makes you uncomfortable and does not respond to verbal pleas or formal warnings should be blocked. This way, they will not be able to know when you are online or be able to contact you through instant messaging. Even if the communications are not particularly aggressive or threatening, if they are annoying, block the sender. (Most ISPs and instant messaging programs have a blocking feature to allow you to prevent the sender from getting through.)

These back-to-school safety tips are far from the only ones, but they will get your kids off to a good start. Talk to them about what they might be concerned with. This often reveals other conversations that need to be had as well.


